1. FIRST OPEN SESSION 12:00 P.M.

President Naumann called the meeting to order at 12p.m.

1.1 Public Comments

Information Item

President Naumann asked if any members of the public wished to address the Board on any matter on the Closed Session agenda or on any non-agenda item within the jurisdiction of the Board. No public comments were offered.

President Naumann then asked District Legal Counsel Mr. Boyer to advise the public of the matters to be discussed during Executive Session. Mr. Boyer reported that the Board would be discussing the District's conference with SEIU Local 721's Labor Negotiators (Labor Negotiations Government Code 54957.6); real property negotiations for the current District's office property (Real Property Negotiations Government Code Section 54956.8); four cases of existing litigation (Government Code Section 54956.9 (d)(1)), and three cases of anticipated litigation (Government Code Section 54956.9(d)(2)).

President Naumann then adjourned the meeting into Executive Session at 12:05p.m.

1.2 EXECUTIVE (CLOSED) SESSION 12:05 P.M.

2. SECOND OPEN SESSION AND CALL TO ORDER 1:00 P.M.

President Naumann called the second open session of the UWCD Board of Directors meeting to order at 1p.m.

2.1 Pledge of Allegiance

Director McFadden led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance.

2.2 Public Comment

Information Item

President Naumann asked if any members of the public wished to address the Board or provide a comment on any of the agendized items or on any non-agenda item within the jurisdiction of the Board. No public comments were offered.

2.3 Approval of Agenda

Motion

President Naumann asked if there were any changes to the agenda as presented. Mr. Guardado replied that there were no changes to the agenda.

Motion to approve the agenda, Director McFadden; Second, Director Mobley. Voice vote: six ayes (Berger, Dandy, Eranio, McFadden, Mobley, Naumann); none opposed; one absent (Maulhardt). Motion carries 6/0/1.

2.4 Oral Report Regarding Executive (Closed) Session Information Item

District Legal Counsel David D. Boyer reported that the Board took no reportable action under the Brown Act while in Executive session.

2.5 Board Communication Information Item

Director Berger reported that he attended the media event at Saticoy on Friday, June 14, in recognition of the UWCD FCGMA water release. He also attended the Finance Committee meeting on July 9 and the AWA Board meeting earlier today. Director Berger also reminded the Board that there would be no WaterWise Breakfast this month.

Director McFadden reported his participation at the UWCD FCGMA water release event at Saticoy as well as the Planning Committee meeting on June 17, the AWA meeting on June 20, the FPB GSA meeting on June 20 and a Special Budget review meeting of the FPB GSA on June 24. He also attended the Water Commission meeting on June 25, the Operations Committee meeting on July 2 and a FPB GSA ad hoc committee meeting on July 8.

Director Mobley reported his participation at the Mound Basin GSA Board meeting on June 20; the Groundwater Committee meeting on June 25; the Finance Committee meeting on July 9 and that he would be participating in the Ethics and Sexual Harassment Prevention training for Board members tomorrow.

Director Eranio reported that, since the June 12 Board meeting, he has participated in a meeting with Oxnard/Pleasant Valley and District staff regarding FCGMA Ordinance language. On June 26 the FCGMA met regarding changes to the allocation language, but the ordinance was not adopted. Director Eranio also participated in the Groundwater Committee meeting on June 25 and the Planning Committee meeting on June 17. He was available for a photo opp at Saticoy on June 14, representing both FCGMA and United. He attended the AWA Breakfast in Oxnard on June 20, and will be the guest of Naval Base Ventura County's Commanding Officer for a special Community Reception on July 26 from 5 to 8p.m.

Director Dandy reported his participation at the VCSDA on June 4 regarding LAFCo; Finance Committee meeting on June 11, Board meeting on June 12, and Planning Committee meeting on June 17. He and President Naumann participated in the ACWA Region 5 tour of the Montecito and Central Coast region and reported that the tour provided good information, including how State water was being moved with Casitas. Director Dandy also reported his attendance at the AWA Water issues meeting on June 18 and the Board meeting on June 20. He attended the Ventura Water Commission meeting on June 25 and also participated in an AWA presentation to Bill Hair for Lifetime Achievement which Tony Trembley presided over. Director Dandy also reminded the Board that Mr. Siemak would be

making a presentation to the Oxnard Chamber of Commerce water issues group on July 15 and he added that he has also invited City Council and staff to that meeting.

President Naumann reported that he met with the GM to review today's Board materials on July 9 and also had a meeting with the District's consultant Dr. Mathis. He attended the AWA WaterWise Breakfast, the ACWA Regional 5 tour of Montecito's debris flows resulting from the Thomas Fire and subsequent rain storms. He also attended the Pleasant Valley County Water District meeting held at the District on July 2, to provide an update on budget and quaggas. Me also attended the Ventura County Water Commission meeting, during which the Springville pipeline in Camarillo was discussed, and attended a Fox Canyon GMA meeting.

2.6 General Manager's Report Information Item

General Manager Mauricio Guardado announced the promotion of Erin Gorospe to Controller, adding that Ms. Gorospe works for both the Fillmore and Piru Basin GSA and Mound Basin GSA and that her professionalism and skills continue to add to UWCD's value. Director McFadden echoed his sentiments and stated that the GSAs wouldn't work without Erin and he appreciates her many contributions.

Mr. Guardado congratulated Brian Collins and the Operations and Maintenance team on receiving the AWWA Outstanding Energy Management Award on behlf of the District. The award, which will be presented in October at the organization's annual conference recognizes United Water Conservation District's efforts to reduce its annual energy costs by 26 percent. He also thanked Dr. Bram Sercu for doing water recharge demonstrations at the Boys & Girls Club of Santa Clara Valley event and mentioned Lake Piru's new Junior Ranger program and the District's participation in the Water Education Foundation's Edge of Drought Tour, coming up in August, which will include a tour of the Freeman Diversion and a dinner presentation from UWCD.

Mr. Guardado then shared a presentation on the potential of State Water Table A and Article 21 water purchases being available in January (see attached presentation).

2.7 <u>Resolution 2019-17</u> Special District Risk Management Authority (SDRMA) Board of Directors Election Motion

On the recommendation of Director Dandy, the Board adopted <u>Resolution 2019-17</u>, casting the District's ballot for Jesse D. Claypool, Patrick K. O'Rourke and Sandy Seifert-Raffelson for the SDRMA Board of Directors. Motion Director Dandy; Second, Director Mobley. Voice vote: six ayes (Berger, Dandy, Eranio, McFadden, Mobley, Naumann); none opposed, one absent (Maulhardt). <u>Resolution 2019-17</u> adopted 6/0/1.

2.8 Update on Prop. 1 Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) Grant projects

The Board received an update on Department of Water Resources' Proposition I Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) Grant projects from Lynn Rodriquez, Program Manager, Watersheds Coalition of Ventura County. (see attached presentation).

The Board members and Ms. Rodriquez had a lengthy discussion of various grant programs and steps the District can take to identify potential funding opportunities. Ms. Rodriquez also brought Governor Newsome's Executive Order on the Development of a Water Resiliency Portfolio across California and encouraged the District to reach out and get involved in those discussions as she said "the new administration is moving fast to achieve these goals."

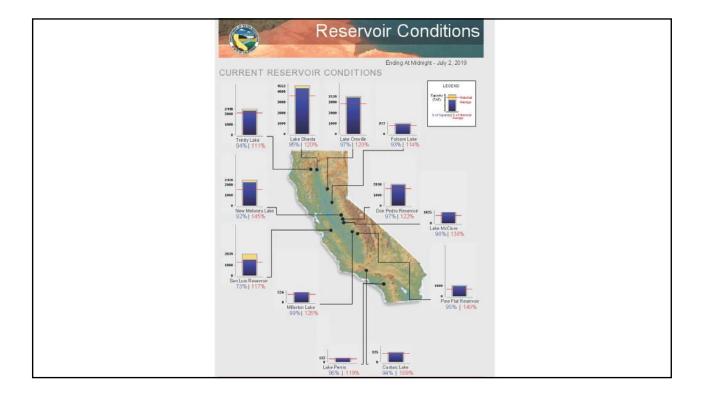

IRWM Planning

What is IRWM?

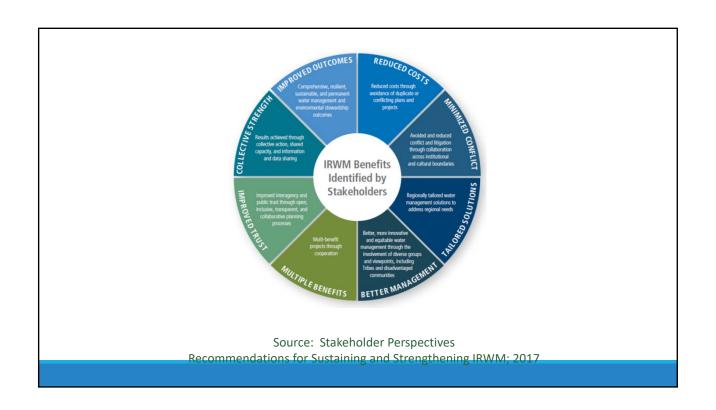
- Collaborative effort to manage all aspects of water resources in a region
- Crosses jurisdictional, watershed, and political boundaries
- Involves multiple agencies, stakeholders, individuals, and groups
- Attempts to address issues and differing perspectives through mutually beneficial solutions

Integrated water management is a comprehensive and collaborative approach for managing water to concurrently achieve social, environmental, and economic objectives.

This integrated approach delivers higher value for investments by considering all interests, providing multiple benefits, and working across jurisdictional boundaries at the appropriate geographic scale.

Examples of multiple benefits include improved water quality, better flood management, restored and enhanced ecosystems, and more reliable water supplies.

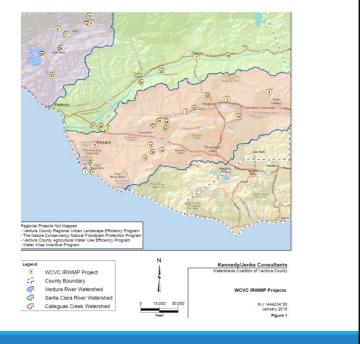

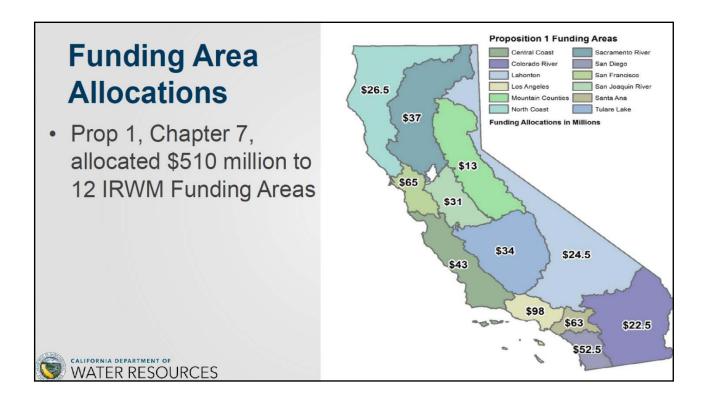

FCGMA Finances

Allocation Ordinance (Pt. 1)

FCGMA staff recommended:

- 1. PVCWD be given allocation for Conejo Creek diversions
- Base OH well field allocation on historical pumping (Supplemental M&I Program)
- 3. Santa Clara River Flex Allocation does not require revision to allow carry-over

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Allocation Ordinance (Pt. 2)

- United staff and public concerns:
 - · Impacts of ordinance have not been fully evaluated
 - Especially SCR Flex Allocation and PTP pumping allocation
 - Should reconsider "one-water" concept
 - No true-up on SCR Flex Allocation
 - Water emergency language insufficient
- More time desired for evaluation
- Staff instructed to evaluate further
